Admissions

Admissions Criteria

Halliford prepares its students for GCSE, A Level and entry to Further Education. The principal criteria are therefore academic and based on the School's assessment as to whether a prospective candidate is suitable for the academic programme. The School will not accept students for whom success at GCSE and progression to the Sixth Form would be an unrealistic expectation. Progression to the Upper Sixth is dependent on satisfactory performance in the Lower Sixth.

The family nature of the School is underlined by the fact that brothers and sisters are usually offered a place as long as they meet the minimum academic entry requirements. In addition, parental commitment to the School and its ethos is as important a factor as academic success when offers of places are made.

We require parents of children with special educational needs or disabilities to discuss their child's needs with the School before the close of registration so that we can make adequate provision for them before they sit the entrance examination. Please refer to our Admissions Policy on our website.

Registration

Before a child can be considered for a place at Halliford, the online registration form must be completed and submitted to the Registrar with a non-refundable fee of £150 inclusive of VAT. The registration fee for overseas candidates is £200 inclusive of VAT.

Registration Deadline

Registration for Year 7 entry in September 2026, Year 9 entry in September 2028 and Sixth Form entry in September 2026 closes on Friday 28th November 2025.

The registration deadline is also the deadline for scholarship applications and for parents to submit supporting documents, including specialist SEND reports. The bursary application deadline is Friday 14th November 2025, two weeks prior to the registration deadline.

Applications received after the close of registration will be considered at the discretion of the Registrar.

Admissions Procedure

Once a child has been registered they will be considered for entry to Halliford via the following procedure:

- An interview with the Headmaster or Deputy Head prior to the Entrance Examination
- A suitable reference from the candidate's current school
- A satisfactory standard in the entrance examination

11+ (Year 7) Admissions - Assessments taken in Year 6

Candidates will sit papers in English, Mathematics, Verbal and Non-Verbal Reasoning.

English: this paper in in three parts - comprehension, spelling, punctuation and grammar, and creative writing.

Mathematics: this is based on National Curriculum level 4.

Verbal and Non-Verbal Reasoning tests are computer-adaptive.

13+ (Year 9) Admissions - Assessments taken in Year 6

This test is similar in format to the 11+ entry examination. Unconditional places will be offered based on the result of these tests. Offers are not dependent upon results at Common Entrance or similar examinations, however the School welcomes information from these tests to assist students' transition to Halliford.

12+ (Year 9) Admissions - Assessments taken in Year 7

If there are places available, candidates will sit age-appropriate tests in English, Mathematics, Verbal and Non-Verbal Reasoning.

All of the above examinations will take place on Tuesday 6th January 2026.

Sixth Form Entry

Students may apply to enter the Sixth Form to study for A Levels. Entry into the Sixth Form is based on a satisfactory report from the previous school, an interview with the Headmaster and Head of Sixth Form and a minimum of five GCSEs at Grade 5 or above including English and Mathematics. Students should achieve a minimum of a Grade 6 in the subjects they wish to study at A Level. Candidates are encouraged to visit the School either during the main school open days or, preferably, by attending the Sixth Form Open Evening. This will give them the opportunity to discuss Sixth Form options with members of the academic staff.

Entry at other points in the School

Students occasionally enter Halliford at other age points if there are vacancies. The entry procedure is, in principle, the same as for the stages described above.

Scholarships

The School offers scholarships up to the value of 10% per annum of the annual tuition fees for entry in Year 7, Year 9 and the Sixth Form. The scholarships are awarded for academic, artistic, dramatic, musical and sporting excellence. The online scholarship application form is available on our website and needs to be completed by the close of registration. 13+ scholarships will be assessed at the same time as the pre-test is taken.

11+ / 13+ SCHOLARSHIPS

Academic Scholarships

Students who perform exceptionally overall in the 11+ and 13+ entrance examinations are invited to an Academic Scholarship interview with the Headmaster. Students who excel in both the entrance examination and the interview process will be offered an Academic Scholarship.

Drama Scholarships

Candidates will be asked to demonstrate excellence in Dramatic Performance. They will be expected to demonstrate a strong appreciation of theatre, an understanding of production issues and knowledge of theatre outside the school context.

Candidates will be asked to perform a monologue piece of their choosing from a published play up to 2 minutes. Candidates should also expect to be assessed in a group setting where improvisation skills will be observed. Candidates will be asked about the performance they have given, previous performances (where appropriate) and their ambitions in this area. All candidates will also be expected to reach an appropriate standard in the entrance examination.

Art Scholarships

Awards will be made based on the portfolios submitted by candidates and a practical assessment held at Halliford. Portfolios must demonstrate a high level of personal achievement. The practical assessment will consist of a drawing test from still-life objects and an interview with the Head of Art. All candidates will also be expected to reach an appropriate standard in the entrance examination.

Music Scholarships

Music Scholarships are available at 11+ and 13+ for talented students. Candidates will be required to undergo an audition consisting of two pieces of at least Grade 4 standard in their principal instrument/voice and one piece on an additional instrument/voice. They will also undergo a sight-reading, aural comprehension and theory test set by the Director of Music. For candidates offered a music scholarship at 13+ it will be expected that they will continue with their musical studies during the two years prior to entry to Halliford. All candidates will also be expected to reach an appropriate standard in the entrance examination.

Sports Scholarships

Awards will be made based on evidence of sporting achievement at county level or better and physical tests in agility and co-ordination run by the Director of Sport at Halliford. All candidates will also be expected to reach an appropriate standard in the entrance examination.

SIXTH FORM SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarships up to the value of 10% per annum of the annual tuition fees are available for both internal and external candidates showing excellence whether academic, musical, artistic, dramatic or sporting. All applicants will need to meet the expected requirements for entry into the Sixth Form as detailed in the Sixth Form Prospectus. Application forms can be found on the School website.

Sixth Form Academic Scholarships

Offers of Sixth Form Academic Scholarships are made after the publication of GCSE results. To be eligible for a scholarship, students should have achieved at least a Grade 8 in each of their GCSE subjects. Following GCSE Results Day, potential scholars may be invited for an interview with the Headmaster. Sixth Form Academic Scholarships are available up to the value of 10% per annum of the annual tuition fees and will be awarded for the two-year duration of their A Level studies. However, for the scholarship to be maintained, the academic scholars must demonstrate good academic habits (defined as achieving at least a 4.1 Behaviour for Learning average score), which should lead to them achieving at least a Grade B in all their subjects in their End of Year Report.

Sixth Form Drama Scholarships

Scholarship applicants must intend to study A Level Drama for the full two-year course. An interview will be held with the Head of Drama in which the applicant should be able to discuss and produce evidence illustrating an active and ongoing involvement in Drama and Theatre either in their current school or externally. The applicant must prepare a two-minute monologue and be able to talk about it in detail.

Applicants must demonstrate to the Head of Drama they will make a positive contribution to the School. A willingness to participate in a varied programme of theatre visits, workshops and to assist in organising events within the School Drama Department.

Offers, subject to satisfactory final grades, will be made with confirmation after GCSE results have been received. Potential Drama scholars will be required to achieve a Grade 7 or above at GCSE. Scholarships up to the value of 10% will be awarded for the full two-year A Level course and are dependent on the scholar demonstrating good academic habits defined as achieving at least a 4.1 Behaviour for Learning average score in every round of reporting and in their End of Year Report.

Sixth Form Sport Scholarships

GCSE PE is not necessarily required, nor is the intention to study A Level PE. However, applicants will be required to take the lead in school sport and represent the School regularly. Selection and participation in either one sport at county or national level in a representative school sport or a range of sports at school and club level is required. Applicants must always demonstrate the highest standard of sportsmanship.

Mentoring and Coaching for younger players is expected. The applicant should have a passion for the subject and be willing, enthusiastic, reliable, and hard-working. Applicants must be committed to attending practices at lunchtime and after school along with matches on Saturdays and to participate in all team matches for which he or she is selected.

An interview will be held with the Director of Sport and applicants will need to provide evidence of their sporting ability and an external reference as to their competency, level achieved and aspirational level.

Offers, subject to final grades, will be made with confirmation after GCSE results have been received. Scholarships up to the value of 10% will be awarded for the full two-year A Level course and are dependent on the scholar demonstrating good academic habits defined as achieving at least a 4.1 Behaviour for Learning average score in every round of reporting and in their End of Year Report.

Sixth Form Music Scholarships

GCSE Music is not necessarily required, nor is the intention to study A Level Music. However, applicants will have to demonstrate passion and commitment to music. For example, by playing in an orchestra, singing in a choir and through grade examinations.

Applicants need to offer two instruments (one can be voice), one of which should be at least Grade 6 standard.

Music scholars are expected to make a significant contribution to the activities of the Music Department and to support the work of younger musicians through the School.

An audition will be held with the Director of Music and applicants will be required to play two pieces on their first study. These should be contrasting pieces. Applicants will then be required to perform a piece on their second study instrument/voice.

Applicants must be prepared to discuss their performances and to undergo a sight-reading and aural perception test.

Offers, subject to final grades, will be made with confirmation after GCSE results have been received. Scholarships up to the value of 10% will be awarded for the full two-year A Level course and are dependent on the scholar demonstrating good academic habits defined as achieving at least a 4.1 Behaviour for Learning average score in every round of reporting and in their End of Year Report.

Sixth Form Art & Design Scholarships

Applicants should intend to study A Level Art & Design for the full two-year course.

An interview will be held with the Head of Art in which the applicant will need to show a portfolio of their artwork. The portfolio should contain all GCSE artwork. If the work is 3D or large then good, A4 (minimum) photographs of the work will be accepted. If you have done other creative work outside of your GCSE Art course then please include examples. If you have them, your portfolio should also include sketchbooks, journals, and essays.

Applicants should demonstrate to the Head of Art that they will make a positive contribution to the School. The applicant should have great enthusiasm for the subject and be willing, reliable, hard-working, resilient, independent and resourceful with an aptitude for taking personal initiative and going the extra mile beyond the guidance given or the work set by the teacher. Intellectual curiosity, a willingness to independently visit galleries & museums and an interest in researching art & design in all of its forms are essential attributes. All Art scholars are expected to demonstrate their commitment to the subject by participating in extra-curricular sessions offered by the School in addition to timetabled lessons.

Applicants will be invited to attend a drawing test for one hour along with an interview with the Head of Art.

Offers, subject to final grades, will be made with confirmation after GCSE results have been received. Scholarships up to the value of 10% will be awarded for the full two-year A Level course and are dependent on the scholar demonstrating good academic habits defined as achieving at least a 4.1 Behaviour for Learning average score in every round of reporting and in their End of Year Report.

STEM Scholarship

Scholarship applicants should intend to study two or more STEM subjects at A Level with current plans to complete higher education in a STEM-related discipline and with aspirations to pursue a career in STEM. A Level STEM subjects include Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Design and Technology, Mathematics, Further Mathematics, Computer Science and Psychology.

An interview will be held with the Head of Departments of the chosen A Level subjects. Students must present ideas about what they would contribute and how they would demonstrate that they will contribute positively to STEM at Halliford. The STEM scholar will be expected to represent the school on a

regular basis and assist in organising events within the Science, Maths, Design & Technology or Psychology Departments, depending on the A Level subjects chosen. They should, for example, be able to run some STEM clubs, present at prep school events and mentor students lower down the school.

STEM scholars will be required to achieve Grade 8 or above at GCSE in Maths and an average of Grade 8 or higher in the Sciences. Scholarships up to the value of 10% will be awarded for the full two-year A Level course and are dependent on the scholar demonstrating good academic habits defined as

achieving at least a 4.1 Behaviour for Learning average score in every round of reporting and in their End of Year Report.

Expectations of Scholars

Those in receipt of scholarships are expected to take a leading part in the academic, dramatic, musical, artistic and sporting life of the School, as considered appropriate by the Deputy Head Academic, Heads of Art, Drama, and Directors of Sport and Music, for the duration of the scholarship. All scholars are expected to maintain a good standard of behaviour and academic work and this performance is reviewed annually.

Bursaries

Introduction

Halliford School is a charitable educational foundation committed to providing the widest possible access, regardless of income, to students from all social, religious and ethnic backgrounds. As part of its efforts to fulfil this remit, the School offers financial assistance through bursaries for those otherwise unable to take advantage of what the School has to offer.

Availability and Allocation of Bursaries

Bursaries are available for entry at 11+ and into the Sixth Form and may also be awarded to relieve hardship where a student's education would otherwise be at risk; for example, where a parent is made redundant. Bursaries for entry at 13+ may also be allocated when available. Bursaries are means-tested and, as a result, there is no standard template. The value of the Bursary can be up to 100% of the tuition fees and, once awarded, will be reviewed annually and could be subject to change depending on parents' financial circumstances. It should be noted that anyone awarded a bursary must also have passed the entrance examination and received a positive recommendation from their previous school.

Application for Bursaries

Applicants wishing to apply for assistance must request the relevant forms from the Bursary Department. Please email: fees@hallifordschool.co.uk as early as possible. For those applying for entry to 11+, 13+ and Sixth Form, the bursary application must be completed and returned by Friday 14th November 2025.

Expectations of Students with Bursaries

All students in receipt of bursaries are expected to work hard at their academic studies, maintain a good standard of behaviour and take part in the wider life of the School. Their performance is reviewed annually and may affect the bursary offer.

The Curriculum

Years 7 to 9

In the Lower School the curriculum is broadly based with emphasis on introducing students to as wide a range of subjects as possible as well as on helping them acquire a sound foundation of the basic skills that they will need to make effective progress as they move up through the School. All students study the following subjects: English, Mathematics, French and either German or Spanish, Latin (and Classical Civilisation from Year 9 onwards), Biology, Chemistry, Physics, History, Geography, Art, Drama, Music, Design Technology, Computer Science, Religious Studies and Physical Education.

Years 10 and 11 (GCSE)

In the Spring Term of Year 9 students select their GCSE options for Years 10 and 11. There is a compulsory core of English Language and Literature, Mathematics, a Modern Foreign Language (French, German or Spanish) and the Sciences (the three separate sciences or the Trilogy Award). In addition, pupils choose a further three optional subjects from amongst the following: a second Modern Foreign Language, Latin, History, Geography, Religious Studies, Classical Civilisation, Art, Drama, Music, Physical Education, Computer Science, Business Studies and Design Technology (Product Design). All students also receive instruction in study skills, careers, citizenship and religious education.

The Sixth Form

The majority of pupils are expected to take three subjects at A Level along with an EPQ (Extended Project Qualification). Exceptionally able students have the option to study four A Levels.

The following subjects are available at A Level: Art, Biology, Business Studies, Chemistry, Classical Civilisation, Computer Science, Design and Technology, Drama and Theatre, Economics, English Literature, French, Geography, German, History, Mathematics, Further Mathematics, Music, Music Technology, Physical Education, Physics, Politics, Psychology, Religious Studies and Spanish.

In addition to their principal subjects all pupils are given the opportunity to complete an Extended Project Qualification (EPQ) during their time in the Sixth Form. Universities look favourably on EPQ as it enables students to develop independent research skills that are extremely useful when they go on to university and some now lower their offers to students if they have achieved an A or an A* in this award.

Setting and Class Sizes

Class sizes range between 16-22 per class in Years 7-9. Setting is introduced in Year 8 for Mathematics and Modern Languages

and in Year 9 for the Sciences. In Years 10 and 11 the core subjects are all taught in at least four sets with the average size for all teaching groups at GCSE being 16 students. At A Level the average size is 12 students or lower.

Study Skills

Study skills are taught at various stages throughout a student's career at Halliford. A new bespoke study skills course has been introduced in Year 9 to support students as they embark on their GCSE studies.

Exceptional Performers

Exceptional performers are identified early and their progress carefully monitored. At all stages, staffare expected to challenge and encourage them. There is also a special programme which includes academic discussions and talks, attending lectures and going on specially selected visits. The programme is designed to deepen and broaden their intellectual interests.

Learning Support

All students joining Halliford School are expected to be able to manage in a mainstream classroom setting. Upon entry, all students joining the School are assessed using specialist diagnostic software. Those students identified or confirmed as having a special need will then have a specific programme organised as necessary. The overwhelming majority of students with identified special educational needs are supported by their teachers in the classroom. Staff are trained in the delivery of Quality First Teaching which means that they are expected to plan lessons with the diverse needs of their learners in mind.

In the overwhelming majority of cases, the only support needed is staff awareness. In a few cases, it may be necessary to provide some specialist teaching outside the standard programme. This teaching is provided in house by a full-time Learning Support Co-ordinator. It is the task of the Learning Support Co-ordinator to arrange the testing and liaise with parents and staff in the creation of any programme. All staff are regularly trained in how to look after students with special needs but the School only provides a classroom assistant for a student with an EHCP (Education, Health and Care Plan) when applicable. An additional charge will be made if students require additional one-to-one support.

PSHE

PSHE is taught throughout the School by tutors in a dedicated period once a week.

This is supported with a comprehensive range of outside speakers and visits, in School and House assemblies and by individual subject teachers within their subject areas when appropriate. In addition, the behaviour, attitudes, and bearing of staff and senior students also provide positive examples.

Pastoral Care

Introduction

Providing effective pastoral care is central to the life and work of Halliford School. The School aims to create an environment in which students feel secure, their behaviour is respectful of others and discipline can be managed with a light touch. This is achieved by a mixture of personal example, by the obvious care taken for the needs of each student and through the existence of a nurturing ethos in which respect and concern for every individual are paramount.

The Deputy Head Pastoral supervises the workings of the pastoral system in conjunction with the Headmaster and Director of Student Welfare. A School Pastoral Committee meets weekly to discuss the wellbeing of students, conduct, rewards and progress.

The House System

The School is divided into four Houses - Desborough, Greville, Russell and Wadham. Each House is supervised by a Head of House and has a dedicated tutor team. The Houses provide a focus for competition as well as pastoral care.

The Tutor System

At the heart of the pastoral organisation of the School is the tutor system, which is House and year-group-based. There are four House-based tutor groups each year. A specialist team of tutors look after Year 7, coordinated by the Head of Year 7. Thereafter, a student will retain the same tutor from Years 8-11. Sixth Form tutors then guide students in the Lower and Upper Sixth. The Sixth Form programme is overseen by the Head of Sixth Form. The Deputy Head Pastoral has overall responsibility for the day-to-day management of pastoral care.

Mental Health and Wellbeing

For a number of years, the School has been proactive in trying to destigmatise mental health issues among our young people. These topics are discussed openly in School and House assemblies, as well as in Tutor time. The students are encouraged to not only share any worries they have personally but also ones they might have about their peers. All staff have done extensive training on identifying the signs of poor mental health, with a number having Mental Health First Aid Qualifications. The School has supported the Movember Charity for several years, with a special focus on the Mental Health work that the charity does. In 2023, the School raised £9,021, making it the third-highest fundraising school in the country.

Behaviour and Discipline

The School does not tolerate poor behaviour and will reward good behaviour and work. Any incidents of poor behaviour will be dealt with promptly and with fairness and consistency. There will also be a restorative element to this process in order to help the students move forward in a positive manner. We will involve parents in the process and hope that behaviour patterns can be rectified promptly. Good behaviour is encouraged through the use of a rewards system including merits, benes and commendations. Poor behaviour is challenged by implementing a range of sanctions including work points, behaviour points, and detentions. A copy of the School's behaviour policy, including the sanctions used by the School, can be found on the School website. It is also available on request from the School office.

Suspensions and Exclusions

Suspensions and Exclusions are infrequent and there are clear guidelines as to their use. The Headmaster and Deputy Heads may suspend students. This will be for a fixed term, between one and five days. Only the Headmaster may exclude students permanently and this is only after having consulted the Board of Governors. The policies covering suspension and exclusion can be found on the School website and are also available from the School office on request.

Anti-Bullying

The School does not tolerate bullying in any form. It takes active steps to discourage bullying and acts quickly when any bullying is brought to its attention, whether by parents, students or staff. A copy of the School anti-bullying policy can be found on the School website and is available upon request from the School office.

Child Protection

The Deputy Head Pastoral is the School's Designated Safeguarding Lead. All staff are also regularly trained in child protection. The School has a comprehensive Safeguarding and Child Protection policy and this can be found on the School website and is available on request from the School office.

Matron

The School has two part-time matrons who cover the full week providing care and attention as required. The School also has a large number of staff qualified in First Aid. The School ensures that appropriate first aid cover is immediately available for all home sports fixtures.

Counsellor and Chaplain

Halliford has a School Counsellor who works two days per week and can also offer ELSA sessions with one of the matrons. Referrals are made through the Director of Student Welfare. The Rector of Shepperton is the visiting Chaplain to the School. She delivers regular assemblies and is available for counselling and quidance where necessary.

Typical Clubs and Activities

We are delighted to be able to offer our students a wide variety of learning experiences outside the classroom to support and enhance the learning that goes on inside the classroom. We believe these are an invaluable part of our students' education and strongly encourage students to participate. Clubs and activities help embed the school's core values with opportunities to show teamwork, resilience and intellectual curiosity. There are compulsory clubs where students in Years 7 and 8 learn core skills such as basic first aid, self-defence or sign language, with many opportunities to lead clubs of various interests such as the anime, automotive or Warhammer Clubs.

The School runs many day trips for students such as theatre trips for Drama, or visits to academic conferences or museums in academic subjects such as Art and Psychology and Geography field trips. We have a long-standing annual exchange with the Holstenschule in Neumunster, Germany for our students learning German and biannual exchanges with the Institut St Louis St Clément, France and with a school in Salamanca for our students learning French and Spanish, respectively. Other recent overseas visits include the annual History Department trip to the Battlefields for Year 9, the Music Department Tour to Sorrento for Choir and Orchestra and the Theatre or Business Studies trip to New York. On the sporting front, on top of our regular home and away fixtures in various sports, the Sports Department organises an extensive overseas Rugby Tour every three years alongside an annual Football Tour for Year 9 and a Cricket Tour for Year 10. Our annual ski trip in the Easter holidays is also very popular, with over 100 students joining us on our trip to Passo Tonale, Italy in 2024.

The Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme is very popular at Halliford, with 92% of Year 9 students participating in the Bronze Award and a third of Year 10 students currently completing the Silver Award. These involve training days at Halliford or expeditions across the Surrey Downs or New Forest. The highly prestigious Gold Award is also available to students, and plans are being considered for the final expedition to Norway in 2025.

Activities Week at the end of the Summer Term provides an ideal opportunity to get all the students from each year group to go away together and get involved in a variety of activities both on and off the school site. These include the Year 7 trip to France, visits to Outdoor Learning Activity Centres for Year 8 and Year 10, the Year 9 trip to Ypres, and a residential team building experience for Lower Sixth.

Communication

Communication with Parents

Just as pastoral care is central to the life and work of the School, good communication with parents is central to the effectiveness of that care. Most communication is informal and takes place regularly between parents, subject teachers and tutors. Formal communication begins with the Student Planner possessed by every student in the Lower School (Years 7 to 11). Parents are asked to read and sign the planner weekly. Halliford School's Parent Portal also provides parents with discreet information about their child's progress and enables parents to view their child's attendance, timetables, reports and other information.

Communication regarding academic matters should initially be made to the Form Tutor and Head of House. If further communication is required, this should be directed to the Head of Department before being directed to the Deputy Head Academic should further support be required.

Communication regarding pastoral and behavioural matters should initially be made to the Form Tutor and Head of House. If further communication is required, this should be directed to the Deputy Head Pastoral if necessary. The Headmaster is available, often at short notice if further communication regarding academic, pastoral or behavioural matters is required.

A weekly update letter is sent out by the Assistant Head Co-Curricular and aims to reduce multiple individual emails each

week with details of changes to the calendar and all matters that require parents' attention with upcoming events and trips. The update letter also includes information on upcoming events and ways to book tickets in one convenient place.

Contact with the Chairman of Governors

The Chairman of Governors can be contacted via the Bursar who is also the Clerk to Governors.

PTA

There is a flourishing Parent/Teachers' Association and there are a number of activities in which parents are cordially invited to take part. The Halliford PTA is a registered charity in its own right. While fundraising is an important part of the PTA's activities there are also opportunities for parents and teachers to meet socially.

Parents' Evenings

Every year there are two parent/teacher evenings for each year group to enable parents to discuss their child's progress with the staff who teach them. We encourage parents to bring their child with them to these evenings to engage in a discussion with their teachers and parents about their progress.



School Routine

School Day

The school day begins at 8.35am with registration and finishes at 3.45pm. There is a lunch break of one hour. Students are encouraged to have a cooked lunch, which is paid for termly in advance. The School has its own catering team who rightly pride themselves on the quality and variety of the food that they produce. There is a supervised homework period from 4.00pm to 5.00pm which is available for any student. A wide range of co-curricular activities take place from 4.00pm to 5.30pm. Parents need to note that most sporting fixtures take place on Saturday mornings.

School Uniform

All students in Years 7 to 11 are required to wear a uniform. In the Sixth Form they are required to conform to the same dress code as the teaching staff. Students are expected to take pride in their appearance and the school uniform. They are expected to wear the correct uniform at all times when in the School and when travelling to and from the School. Hair length and style must be conventional and avoid eccentricity; it must be cut above the eyes at the front, above the collar at the back and be its natural colour. Jewellery of any kind, including studs and earrings, may not be worn.

Fees and Charges

for Academic Year 2024-2025

School Fees are payable in full on, or before, the first day of every term. The fees cover the normal curriculum together with most books and stationery. Public examination costs, however, are dependent upon the subject taken; consequently, they are invoiced as additional items that must be paid for. The School also offers a number of optional extras; School Trips, School Lunches, School Bus Service, Fees Refund Scheme, AXA PPP Healthcare Scheme and PTA Subscription. Where a parent agrees to one or more of these extras being taken they will be charged as additional items on the termly invoice. School trips are charged for separately using online payment system ParentPay, and Music Tuition (Instruments and Voice) is invoiced directly from the music teacher. Personal Accident, Dental Insurance, and Pupils Personal Effects Insurance are included in the fees. Parents of all new students are expected to purchase a Microsoft Surface Go device directly from the School to support their child's learning.

Fees and charges are reviewed annually and the Governors endeavour to restrict any fee increases to an annual increase effective from September. However, they reserve the right to increase the fees during the School year in the event of unforeseen circumstances. All fees and charges are subject to the Standard Terms and Conditions; a copy of which, along with details of any of the optional extras can be obtained from the Bursary Department.

The fees and charges for the academic year 2024-2025 are subject to alteration from January 2025 due to VAT.


